


02A. Adults attended activities 1,436 times






03. Adults and children attended 'Parent Engagement' programs 393 times





# Science




This term Years 3 and 4 are learning about chemical science with students investigating the states of matter. They will learn about solids, liquids and gases, and conduct experiments exploring changes in matter. Students will also be learning about melting and freezing and there will be many fun activities that include making ice cream, sherbet and investigating the strange properties/behaviour of Ooblek.

Students in Years 5 and 6 are currently in the final stages of completing their news report on a natural disaster of their choice. They will be presenting their videos to the class, and some will also present at a school assembly. I am really looking forward to seeing their final products.

In the second half of the semester students will be learning about chemical science. The focus will be on reversible and irreversible changes to matter which will be explored through a series of experiments. They will also be investigating mould and mystery powders.

This term in Drama the Foundation - Year 2 students are working on a range of exciting skills. The Year 1 and 2's are learning to read scripts, which ties in nicely with literacy in the classroom. They are focusing on projecting their voice and using expression. We will also be looking at creating plays and exploring settings, props and costumes. Foundation Students have been learning to create freeze frames that tell a story. They are working on using body movements and their voices to perform a play. They will continue to explore this through the use of puppets.







# Performing Arts

In Music this term, the Foundation students are continuing to learn about beat, pitch, dynamics and tempo. The students will also be introduced to some songs related to the Zoo and Zoo animals. In Year 1 we are continuing to learn about pitch, melody, dynamics, tempo and be introduced to form in music. In Year 2, the students are continuing their learning about rhythm, pitch, melody, form, dynamics and will continue to increase their knowledge of texture and tone colour in music. They will be introduced to the duration in music. The students will be performing their own songs, using notes C, D and E, and playing the song on a glockenspiel for the whole class. Students in Years 1 and 2 will be studying songs and dances from different countries around the world. All classes sing, play instruments, and play musical games.

This term, Foundation and Year 1 students have been continuing to develop fundamental movement skills. Students have been participating in tabloid sports with their grade. They have thoroughly enjoyed the different activity stations and rotations. We have been using balls and bean bags to develop throwing skills, soccer balls for kicking techniques and small basketballs to practise our goal shooting. Our tabloid sports have given students great opportunities to cooperate with others when participating in physical activities. Foundation and Year 1 students have continued focusing on throwing and catching while also having lots of fun playing ball games.

In Term 3, students have learnt to skip using skipping ropes. They are demonstrating increased confidence and improved coordination with their skipping skills. The Foundation and Year 1 students are also enjoying using hula hoops during PE lessons. Students have learnt to twirl the hula hoops around their waist and arms. They are very proud of these wonderful tricks and have enthusiastically shared their new skills with classmates! Students have also had fun learning The Chicken Dance this term!

They are encouraged to develop the skills, techniques, and processes that will allow them to express their ideas and creativity. A conscious effort is made to challenge students to place more emphasis on the process of making art rather than the final product while exposing students to a wide range of art forms and media. Students will also keep working on their artist statements, which teach them how to express their personal ideas, emotions, and imaginations through their artwork.


Students' artwork is displayed in the school art gallery, giving students a sense of accomplishment and pride.

### Maths in Action

During Term 3 in Maths in Action the Year 3 and 4 students will be learning about area of regular and irregular shapes. They will use grid paper to construct their own shapes and use informal units such as centicubes to calculate area. Students will then learn about volume of rectangular prims and cubes, investigating different methods to calculate volume in centimetres and metres cubed. Lastly, students will undertake a unit on chance and probability, using language ranging from impossible to certain and place chance events in order on a scale from 0 to 1. Students will also be trialling different experiments involving coins and dice during the study of chance and probability.

Year 5 and 6 students will be learning about the units of measurement involving length, area and maths. Students will then move on to converting between these units of measurement. We will also be investigating the relationship between volume and capacity, making connections between millilitres and litres. Afterwards, students will commence a unit on chance and probability and carry out chance experiments involving likely outcomes and represent probabilities of those outcomes using fractions and percentages.

#### 5 TIPS TO GET YOUR CHILD E OFF THEIR EMOTIONAL ROLLERCOASTER:

CONNECT WITH YOUR CHILD

Use **empathy** to show their emotional outbursts don't make you love them any less.

"I can see that you're struggling right now, and I'm here for you. I love you."

PELP THEM UNDERSTAND HOW THEY ARE FEELING

Avoid **telling** them how they should feel about a situation. Instead, **help** them understand how they are feeling.

"I can see that your body is tense and you're breathing fast. It looks like you're feeling angry and frustrated."

BRAINSTORM IDEAS FOR DEALING WITH BIG EMOTIONS TOGETHER

Remind them of these ideas when they need them.

"Next time you feel this way, what would help? What could you tell yourself to help ride it out?"

TALK TO YOUR CHILD

Wait until they are in a more **emotionally stable place**. Then, **talk about their behaviors** and what they need to do differently.

"Remember when you were very angry yesterday? Let's talk about how I can help you next time you're feeling that way."

TEACH YOUR CHILD A "BIG EMOTIONS MANTRA":




